***Live-ology Lab: Science and History in Action*** opens at the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History Jan. 25 and runs through Feb. 23. Inspired by questions heard daily from visitors at the Museum, ***Live-ology Lab*** assembles a host of experiences that will astound and delight learners of all ages.

Guests will learn to make large, exotic, and even *square* bubbles, and learn basic principles of flight with stomp rockets and paper airplanes. They will be able to meet and touch some of the most interesting creatures in the Museum's live animal collection and get their hands on all kinds of fun tools that teach us about seeing and hearing. Dynamic science presentations using liquid nitrogen, videos and even a cow's eye will allow for deeper explorations of the world around us. An architecture zone will spur budding designers to use special blocks to create modern marvels. Special guests will lead history activities focused on Native American culture and the American cowboy.

***Live-ology Lab*** builds to a crescendo during its last week at the Museum, beginning Sat. Feb. 17, which coincides with Engineers Week. That Saturday and during the entire week guest professionals from Lockheed Martin, the UTA Automation and Robotics Research

Institute and other organizations will be at the Museum leading hands-on activities related to the field of engineering. These special Engineering Week activities are scheduled for Sat. Feb. 17 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Monday-Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Friday, Feb. 23 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.
