**“All Systems Earth” Festival  
Celebrates Earth Week**

**Fort Worth** – The Fort Worth Museum of Science and History will celebrate Earth Week 2015 with a variety of activities and programs that inspire environmental awareness and green practices.

“All Systems Earth” will celebrate the many ways that nature maintains its balance, as well as share information about how humans can support that process. Guests will have a chance to explore rocks, soil and the secrets of a rotting log. They can also learn about composting and plants, as well as about butterflies, insects and other plant pollinators.

“The best way to learn about nature is to experience it,” said Kit Goolsby, Executive Vice President of Interpretation. “We’re eager to give guests the chance to explore and discover on their own.”

Activities are scheduled at various times each day:

- **Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, 10 a.m. – 2 p.m.**
- **Thursday, 10 a.m. – 4 p.m.**

Includes extended hours for home-school teachers and students from 1-4 p.m.

- **Saturday, 10 a.m. – 4 p.m.**

Trinity Science Solutions will exhibit “Orbit Earth Expo.” Guests can experience eclipses, seasonal and lunar cycles, and day and night cycles. They will also identify characteristics of the earth and moon.
